SUDAN PREMIER--CHOU EN-LAI, Premier and Foreign Minister, has received the following message from the Sudan Premier, dated Jan. 7: "Thanks for the solemn recognition which Your Excellency presented on behalf of the Government of the People's Republic of China and for your congratulations on the occasion of Sudan independence. Our relations which started at Bandung will no doubt yield the best fruits of cooperation between the two countries. We would welcome exchange of diplomatic representation and hope soon to be able to discuss the level and extent of representation. I beg to wish yourself and the Chinese people happiness and prosperity and assure Your Excellency of my highest consideration." (Peking, MCMA, English, Jan. 8, 1956, 1705 GMT--W)

MESSAGE TO SUDAN--The China Islamic Association today sent a message of greetings to Premier Ismail Al-Azhari. It reads: "We warmly welcome the birth of the independent Republic of the Sudan and sincerely congratulate the Sudanese people on the victory in their struggle for independence and freedom. We Chinese Moslems, like all Chinese people, entirely support the stand of our Government in declaring its recognition of the Sudan as an independent Republic. We want the friendly relations established between our two countries at the time of the Asian-African Conference to develop steadily and hope that our two countries will soon establish diplomatic relations. We cordially desire that our Moslem brothers in the Sudan, in unity with their non-Moslem brothers, will achieve great successes in building their independent, free, and happy country. PREMIER CHOU EN-LAI has received the following telegram, dated Jan. 5 from M. A. The opening of rail service on the Moscow-Ulan Bator-Peking line will facilitate the further expansion and consolidation of the economic and cultural relations between the USSR, and People's Republic of China, and the Mongolian People's Republic and also the all-sided development of the areas through which the line passes. CHU TE IN BERLIN--The Chinese delegation visited the J. V. Stalin Electrical Equipment Plant in Berlin on the morning of Jan. 5. The delegation was shown round the various workshops by the director of the plant. They also saw the apprentices workshop at the plant. CHU TE spoke to the workers and wished them success in their second Five Year Plan of Socialist construction. (Peking, NCNA, English, Jan. 6, 1956, 0734 GMT--W) CHU TE called on the Chairman of the National Council of the National Front of Democratic Germany, ERICH KORRENS, on the afternoon of Jan. 5. He conveyed the greetings of the Chinese people and the democratic parties of China and was asked to carry back Dr. Korrens' greetings to the 600 million Chinese people. CHU TE and members of the Chinese Government delegation, WEIH JUNG-CHEN, LIU LAN-FAO, and TSENG YUNG-CHUAN visited the Otto Grotewohl Synthetic Petroleum Enterprise and an open cut mine in Boehlen near Leipzig on Jan. 6. The delegation dined with members of the local district committee in Leipzig. In the afternoon they visited the Workers' and Peasants' College at Karl Marx University. They met and talked to more than 120 Chinese students studying in Germany. They also visited the Dimitrov Museum. (Peking, NCNA, English, Jan. 7, 1956, 1400 GMT--W) Vice Chairman CHU TE and members of the Chinese delegation, WEIH JUNG-CHEN, LIU LAN-FAO, and TSENG YUNG-CHUAN visited and laid a wreath at the Socialist martyr's mausoleum in Berlin Jan. 9. They paid homage at the tombs of Karl Liebknecht, Rosa Luxemburg, and Ernst Thaelmann. At 0830 hours, accompanied by Soviet generals stationed in Germany, Vice Chairman CHU TE and the other delegates laid a wreath at the Soviet Army Heroes' Monument. On Jan. 7 CHU TE and the other delegates visited the People's Dockyards at Stralsund. (Peking, NCNA, English, Jan. 9, 1956, 1647 GMT--W)

CHINESE DELEGATION--LIU LAN-FAO, a member of the delegation of the People's Republic of China which came to Berlin to tender greetings to President Pieck on his 80th birthday, attended a workers' meeting at the Karl Marx Locomotive Works in Babelsberg Jan. 5. He was welcomed by more than 1,000 workers at the meeting. Referring to the supply by Democratic Germany of various kinds of rolling stock to China, he said: "Every locomotive or freight car manufactured by the GDR now rolling on Chinese soil is proof of the profound friendship between the people of our two countries."
